Highlights of the King Township May 30 council meeting

Project MOVE moving forward

Council approved building a new municipal office building at 2585 King Rd., site of the former Holy Name school after being presented with three options. The first two involved partial demolition and renovation of the existing building, while the third option called for a complete demolition and new build.

The new build was estimated to cost only 3.7% more than next cheapest option, and it comes with many more benefits, including more cost certainty and a longer life expectancy.

The demolition is slated to start this summer, with the completion of the building scheduled for late 2017.

Application denied

Council refused official plan and zoning bylaw amendments for 325 Warren Road, King City. The application was to split the lot into two parcels. However, the staff report concluded that splitting the lot was not consistent with the overall character of neighbourhood.

Clean yards bylaw

Council received a draft 'clean yards' bylaw for review. The bylaw was designed to deal more efficiently with nuisance and property standards issues. Some of those issues include long grass, overgrown weeds, derelict vehicles, standing water and littering. Council made a few comments and referred the bylaw back to staff. It will come back for approval at a future meeting.

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Holding symbol removed

Council approved lifting the holding symbol for 17 Sproule St. in Schomberg. The symbol was put in place for the DiPoce industrial subdivision to ensure servicing allocation is available, a site plan has been approved by King and the evaluation of Ministry of the Environment land use has been done.

The owner has applied for a 15,823 sq. ft. building for office space/warehousing plus a 4,456 sq. ft. 2nd storey.
